MEMBERSHIP CARDS

Thank you for renewing your membership so promptly. Your membership card is enclosed with this newsletter. We have decided to discontinue sending out new cards every year. Instead, you will notice that the enclosed card now has the date when you joined the society. You may have joined before 1986 but our computerized lists only go back that far. Please keep your card in a safe place since you will need your clan number should you wish to contact me. Please note that your number is always on your mailing label and your membership renewal form as well. I will be happy to issue you a new card any time you need one.

CANADIAN NEWSLETTER

A few years ago we started posting our newsletter on the Elliot Clan website, and Bonnie Ball notifies you when it becomes available. However, partly because of having to mail out the membership cards, we still found it necessary to send out a lot of printed newsletters. With the new cards, we will only need to mail one newsletter a year at membership renewal time. The renewal form that you mail back provides you an opportunity annually to correct outdated data.

We strongly encourage all our members with WEB access to sign up for WEB newsletters. The black and white photos in the printed newsletters do not do justice to our colourful pictures.

SCOTTISH NEWSLETTER



...was an important part of the Border's defense and communication system. Hermitage Castle was built in 1243 and its strength and proximity to the Border insured hot contention with the English for nearly four centuries. The Elliots' association with the Castle has always been a close one. It stands in the center of lands thought to have been granted to the Elliots' Chief in 1320 by Robert the Bruce. After the Union of the Crowns in 1603, Hermitage Castle played no further part in history, with ownership passing to the Scotts of Buccleuch. It was partly restored in 1820 and in 1930 was placed under the guardianship of the Office of Works. As the Newsletter of the Elliot Clan Society, The Signal Tower is mailed to all currently subscribed members free of charge.

HERE'S TO THE HAGGIS AND HUMAN RIGHTS?

Tens of thousand of people around the world, in exotic and wind-swept locations like Khazakstan, Libya, the Kingdom of Fife and even Swansea (in Toronto), celebrated the 250th anniversary of the birth of the poet, plowman and tax collector, Robert Burns in January.

Burn's Immortal Memory was toasted on January 25th, as it is every year, with a measure of verse and, in many cases, a wee dram. But what has become of the man born in a two-room cottage in hardscrabble rural Ayrshire, who fathered 13 children, penned 600 stirring poems and songs and died penniless and tragically young at 37? A lot, actually.

This year the memory of Burns, along with a couple of other pillars of Scots culture, whisky and golf, are being used to entice the estimated 50 million people around the world with Scottish ancestry (see: Scottish Genealogy: www.ancestralscotland.com) back to enjoy a grand homecoming and what hopes to be the largest Gathering of the Clans since Sir Walter Scott's day in 1822 (see: Homecoming Scotland 2009: www.eventscotland.org). Burns, the rock star, will undoubtedly help sell countless tea towels and hip flasks.

Burns is clearly many things to many different people. His work has never been out of print since the first edition of his poems and songs was published in 1786 and he's influenced Woodsworth, Whitman and Bob Dylan. He's been described as one of the finest poets at capturing the awesome beauty and delicate frailty of love and, in the same breath, a scallywag, sensualist and subversive.

And yet, each year, we declaim the comic mock-epic Address to the Haggis, "chieftain of the pudding race", and then raise our glasses for an often saucy Toast to the Lassies, with an even saucier Lassies' Response at our Burns Dinners here and around the world.

A few years ago, Burns' memory and spirit was also celebrated in a speech by then head of the UN, Kofi Annan; "Let us dream, as he did, of a true brotherhood and sisterhood that embraces and encompasses all humankind, and allows all people a chance to enjoy their inalienable rights, dignity and freedom".

Certainly high praise from among the bashed neeps and tatties. Perhaps that is the enduring and tender attraction of Robbie Burns to Scots and others all over the world; that he was a visionary, with a keen sense of his own humanity, who spoke with delicacy, depth and elegance of the pleasures of being alive and living with friendship, honesty and integrity.

At the end of the day, Robert Burns, rock star, immortal poet, non-kilt wearer and instiller of the longings of ancestry, would have been happy to see people gather to enjoy each others company and raise a communal glass, not to him, but to the "warm-reekin" haggis, and for all that it stands.

'CLAN' BY DAVID P ELLIOT

If you are fascinated by your ancestry; and probably none are more enthusiastic than those of Scottish descent; you will probably identify with David Elliot, who became so intrigued with his family history that he wrote a novel based on it.

The story of 'CLAN' is told through the eyes of David Elliot (the author perhaps?) who, at 57 years of age is alone, frustrated and has three failed marriages behind him

When, in 2007 he finds himself out of work, he goes to the Borders of Scotland in search of some validation of his life through his bloodline, the notorious "Border Reivers" – the Elliot Clan.

Accompanied by his daughter, son-in-law and beloved grandson Thomas, far from resolving issues, he finds that he has led them into terrifying danger as 700 years of Scottish Border history and the myth and reality of "The Bloodiest Valley in Britain" combine to threaten all he holds dear in his life.

The corruption of the rich and powerful meets legend as Good and Evil clash for the ancient throne of Scotland and power in the modern world.

William Wallace ("Braveheart"), Robert the Bruce, Border Reivers, creatures of supernatural horror and past heroes of the Elliot Clan are all involved as the Master of Hermitage Castle, the evil Lord, William de Soulis, actions his plan to assume power over an unsuspecting world.

All that stands against him is an ordinary family fighting desperately to protect a child.

Their only weapon is the love of family... the power of their 'Clan'.

The book is an absolute "must" for Elliots (of any of the 70 different versions of that name!) and it has been endorsed by the current Clan Chief of the Elliots, Madam Margaret Eliott of Redheugh who describes it as "A great read!"

Much of the action is based around Hermitage Castle in that part of the Borders of Scotland historically known as "The Debateable Lands" between England & Scotland.

Hermitage still stands for modern day visitors and is considered one of the most haunted sites in Britain. As Margaret Eliott says, "My father (Sir Arthur Eliott, 11th Baronet of Stobs) and some friends tried to stay there overnight when he was young. They were driven out by 10 p.m.!"

If you are an Elliot, or descended from that or any other of the famous Border Clans, if you have an interest in Scottish history or just love thrillers – this book is for you.

GENEALOGY: DO YOU KNOW GEORGE ALEXANDER ELLIOTT?

Born in 1783-84, he grew up in Newry, Armagh County, Ireland, appeared in the USA around the turn of the century, was pressed into service in the US navy and, when released, came to Halifax and joined the Nova Scotia Fencibles, a militia regiment; after Waterloo, he and other disbanded soldiers received land grants to start New Ross in 1816. He is my great great grandfather. His obituary claimed that he was born in Newry but professional researches find no trace.

Does anyone have a George Alexander in your family who may have been seventeen or eighteen by 1800, born elsewhere in Ireland or maybe Scotland? If so, share him with me – and I can tell you lots about him and his family since that time! Thanks.
