
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# PRESIDENT'S REPORT by Catherine Elliot Shaw

# 2013 Elliot Clan Gathering- Scotland

Over August 29 to September 1, 200 members of the Elliot Clan Society gathered at Redheugh, home of our Chief Margaret Eliott.

At Redheugh, attendees could browse through the Clan Room, purchase crested and tartan items, enjoy art and walking stick displays, and explore the grounds. In the dining tent erected on the back meadow, we were served a delicious meal of barbecue lamb. Afterward, Margaret and the Regional Presidents were piped onto the field where our Chief mounted a farm wagon to address her kinsmen. On your behalf, I presented her with a piece of 19<sup>th</sup> century Canadian pressed glass in the "Canadian Thistle" pattern.

The afternoon concluded with an impressive flying display of raptors (hawks, owls and other predatory birds) narrated by their handler. That evening, we enjoyed a ceilidh at the Village Hall with various entertainers. Margaret and family got up to dance the Eightsome Reel, a spirited and fun dance not for the faint of heart!

The next day, many of us attended the Holm Show, a fall fair, in Newcastleton while others toured the surrounding reiver country including our own Hermitage Castle. On Sunday, 47 of us participated in a bus tour organized by Margaret to Flodden Field. Passing through Hawick, we first attended a church service at the Ladykirk just over the Tweed River. Built by James IV in 1500, it was constructed entirely of stone so that it would survive both burning and flooding. The minister crafted the service to include hymns either written by Elliots or with music composed by Elliots. Afterward, we enjoyed a delicious lunch at a nearby hotel. Then it was on to a guided tour of Flodden Field, site of the 1513 battle in which James IV became the last Scottish King to die in combat. The winds were so fierce during our visit that we had to hold onto to each other to keep from being blown away!

During the day I spoke to an interesting gentleman from Inverness in Scotland, who organizes their events for the city. THREE GENERATIONS OF COMEDIC ELLIOTTS HAVE KEPT US LAUGHING FOR OVER 60 YEARS.

Robert Brackett "Bob" Elliott is one-half of the comedy duo of Bob and Ray who began in radio in the 1940s. Later, they moved on to their own television show in the early 1950s as hosts of an ostensibly serious radio program. Elliott and his partner Ray Goulding lent their voices to a variety of recurring characters creating a multilayered world that parodied the real-life world of radio broadcasting. Their "staff" (all voiced by Elliott and Goulding) was a comic menagerie of reporters, book reviewers, actors and all other manner of radio personalities, all of whom interacted with "Bob" and "Ray" as well as with each other. Elliott appeared on a number of other television programs, including Happy Days, Newhart, and Bob & Ray, Jane, Laraine & Gilda in 1979 (with Goulding, Jane Curtin, Laraine Newman and Gilda Radner). He continued making appearances up until 2008 including The American Radio Company of the Air with Garrison Keillor. He is the father of comedian/actor Chris Elliott and the grandfather of former Saturday Night Live cast member Abby Elliott.

Chris Elliott is best known for his comedic sketches on Late Night with David Letterman in which, like his father, he created a series of oddball characters. He has also starred in the cult comedy series Get a Life and had recurring roles on Saturday Night Live, Everybody Loves Raymond and How I Met Your Mother. His movies include Cabin Boy, There's Something About Mary, Scary Movie 2 and Groundhog Day. Elliott currently stars in the Adult Swim series Eagleheart, which starts its third season on November 14, 2013.

His daughter, Abby, decided on an acting career at an early age but switched to comedy after training and performing in various programs. She is the third generation of her family to be featured on *Saturday Night Live* and the second hired to be a cast member (2008 – 2012). She is known for her wide range of celebrity impressions including Christina Aguilera, Angelina Jolie, and Marilyn Monroe.
