SASKATCHEWAN


Hazel Arnold reports:

CECLAND HER DOLLS



Calgarian knits thousands of dolls for kids at Children's Hospital

In a tireless effort to light up the faces and warm the hearts of sick kids, Ceci Chanin, 88, has knitted thousands of soft dolls for the Alberta Children's Hospital.

Just last week, yet another new bag of dolls made its way throughout the hospital, making patients feel better, providing distractions for their siblings, even helping staff educate and explain certain ailments to kids and their families.

"We use the dolls in so many different ways, they go all over the hospital," said Utah Hawley, director of giving with the Children's Hospital Foundation, explaining dolls are used by patients, family and staff.

"They bring a lot of comfort and joy. They lift the kids' spirits and they ensure that they can leave here with some happy memories, too."

Chanin, who started knitting the dolls decades ago for her grandchildren, now makes them for young patients. They are created in all different colours, using soft, washable yarn, purchased by Chanin herself, and with no added buttons or tags to ensure there is no choking hazard.

I do it because I just love to knit," Chanin said. "It keeps my hands busy. And I think the kids really do like them."

She estimates she knits about one doll every day, totalling more than 360 a year. I'm just happy to help any way that I can."

She has also received a certificate of recognition from the Children's Hospital as a thank you for her work.

"But Ceci never really wants a thank you," added Hawley. "She just keeps coming with a new bag of dolls for us."

Al Chanin, Ceci's husband, said they also recently travelled to Mexico a few years ago, where they donated dozens of the dolls to children at a Catholic Church.

"I remember how their faces just lit up, they were so happy to receive them," Ceci said.
