IN MEMORIUM


TOM (THOMAS WESTLEY) ELLIOTT JULY 19, 1941 - DECEMBER 25, 2017

The Elliot Clan Society of Canada sends its sincere sympathies to the family of Tom Elliott, past Chair of the British Columbia Chapter. Tom is survived by his loving wife of 55 years, Bente, children Lori (Clint) Hiscoe, Terri (Tom) Fugel, Wes (Julie) Elliott, and Cori (Nassim Tabri) Elliott, his much beloved grandchildren and numerous nieces and nephews. Tom worked various jobs as a welder, small business owner, operator of a silver and gold mine, and realtor. At the age of 65 he "unretired" himself and started on another journey which took him all over North America delivering recreational vehicles. Tom's passions were travelling with his family, camping, golfing, curling, and fishing and hunting. He was a member of the Coldstream Lions Club and the Rotary Club. Some of Tom's greatest joys were watching his grandchildren in all of their activities, making Christmas cookies with them, or road hunting. Tom's favourite time of the year was Christmas and he was known to play Santa Claus on occasion.

AN ELLIOT IN CANADA'S EARLY AVIATION HISTORY

In the early 1920s, Jack V. Elliot operated an airline out of Hamilton, Ontario, providing passenger service and flights for people eager to experience the thrill of being among the clouds.

By 1925, he opened his own flying school and one of his pupils was Eileen M. Vollick. She had watched fascinated as the aerodrome, hangars, and runway were built near her home and became obsessed with not only the desire to fly and but also a career as a pilot. Many of the positions were taken by First World War veterans of the Canadian Air Force (later Royal Canadian Air Force). By the end of the decade however, the federal government was encouraging the creation of flying clubs to provide learning opportunities for civilians.

Having reached the required age of nineteen years, Eileen quickly began her lessons in a Curtiss JN-4 biplane, although she needed to sit on cushions to reach the controls! To prove her fearlessness, she even made a parachute jump off the wing (with another pilot at the helm) into the waters of Hamilton Bay 850 metres below. In March of 1928, after 16.5 hours of instruction, Eileen Vollick became Canada's first licensed woman pilot. She never realized her dream of being a commercial pilot however as, later that year, she married and moved to Elmhurst, New York.



After a successful period flying men, materials, and mail into northern Ontario, the Jack V. Elliot Air Service merged with the local International Airways.

CLANS AND SCOTTISH SOCIETIES

CASSOC was established in 1975 as a link between various clans and Scottish societies to promote the celebration of Scottish cultural heritage. It embraces history, music, dance, poetry, song, legend, sports, military tradition, costume, custom, culinary art, tale telling and the family structure, both Highland and Lowland.

Its members include: clans and family associations; social clubs; sports associations; Highland Games committees; Highland and Country Dance Associations; academic groups; historical, cultural and linguistic organizations; and Scottish regiments and their associations.

CASSOC supports the observances of traditional feast days and special occasions in Scottish cultural history and was instrumental in creating Tartan Day (April 6) in Ontario, following its origination in Nova Scotia in the late 1980s. The date was chosen as the anniversary of the Declaration of Arbroath in 1320, the Scottish declaration of independence. Tartan Day was officially recognized by the Government of Canada in 2010.

CASSOC publishes a quarterly newsletter *An Drochaid* (The Bridge) to provide information on gatherings, meetings, community and clan events. Each issue contains a variety of articles including news from Scotland, genealogical research, historical figures, recipes, and even Gaelic wedding vows.
