The Breton Story - Part II

The mid-12th century civil war between King Stephen and Henry I's daughter, the Empress Matilda was an opportunistic time for mercenaries engaged in what was mainly siege warfare, but better still was the organisation of Scotland as a feudal military state by the Norman-tutored and French-speaking Kings of the Scots, David I and his grandsons Malcolm IV (the Maiden) and William I (the Lion - 1165-1214).

As for doubts as to links between West Country or Welsh border Eliots and Scotland, further research has soon revealed the award of lands by King David to Somerset and Devon barons, like the Flemish baron, Robert of Bampton, the Berkleys of Castle Cary and the de Braose family who later acquired lands originally in the hands of Judicaël, viscount of the Halegouët. Many men of modest status who prospered during the reigns of David I and his grandsons were originally in the retinues of such migrants.

The history of the Elliot Clan and its formation can only be properly understood within the context of this "Davidian Revolution." Many migrant minor nobles were already vassals of David, who, as Earl of Huntingdon had vast scattered estates in England.

Others were soldiers of fortune, ready to respond to David's urgent need to strengthen an inherently weak monarchy, still confronted with many "no-go" areas in the remote Highland fastnesses. De Brus, a Yorkshire knight, received the vast territory of Annandale, while de Soules got the lordship of Liddesdale. While the lands of old Northumbrian families in the east were left untouched, and their patriarchs sometimes honoured, the vast majority of fiefs were put in the hands of newcomers with continental names.

Not all were Norman. Some were Flemish, like the Murrays and Douglases, while others were Picard, like the Balliols, who still had lands in Picardy. The time to surrender English lands or quit Scotland was still far off. Several "Brito's" have been found in 12th and 13th century charters, like William Brito, a laird or baron who swore fealty to Edward I following the Scots defeat at the Battle of Dunbar in 1296.

King David's project was continued north of the Forth into the still Gaelic lowlands, mainly by his grandson, William the Lion, a man with a love for jousting, often with young Breton, Flemish and Picard knights at his side. Some, like Philip de Valognes, were rewarded with lands to the west of Arbirlot and the royal chamberlainship.

To counter any threats from the north, and from MacBeth pretenders, William built up a large military apparatus, along with some seventy motte and bailey castles, while turning from time to time to mercenaries, especially Flemings, through access to a sophisticated recruitment network run by *locatores*.

Research is continuing into the time, and circumstances in which, the Elliots first got lands in Angus, their presence there and possession of lands can no longer be doubted. This may answer the question as to when and how a unique and exclusive Breton variant toponym was given to a river, Elliot Water.



* MINTO HOUSE FROM THE AIR


16th century tower encased by William Adam house (1738-43), enveloped by Archibald Elliott (1809 -14), altered by 'William Playfair (1837), enlarged with a service wing by Robert Lorimer, who also laid out the stonework terraces to the formal garden (1894-1906). All set in very private and idyllic parkiand.

The V-shaped plan of the house was highly distinctive, the elevations disappointingly bland, but the sequence of internal spaces through the point of the V quite stunning. The house was owned, almost continuously over several centuries, by the Elliot family until it was demolished in 1992.



EDITORS RECOMMENDATION

The Border Reivers' by Godfrey Watson has been reprinted in paperback form by The Sandhill Press Ltd. Re-issued due to popular demand, this book gives a fascinating insight into sixteenth century Border Life. Against a background of robbery and violence, of hangings and excommunication, of Border Law and Border Ballads, stalk the legendary figures of Wat o' Harden and the Bold Buccleuch, of Johnny Armstrong and Kinmont Willie, of Hobby Noble and Jock o' the Side, and the Warden of the Marshes whose unenviable task it was to try and restrain them.



PURSE FRAME JUG



This fine bronze jug is inscribed '+THOMAS:E[L]YOT/+HI RECOMAND ME TO EU/+WYLLEAM:ELYOT. One member of the Elyot family probably commissioned it to present to another on a special occasion. It was clearly a prized piece. Its condition shows that it was kept well polished, and when the handle broke an iron band was riveted on to replace it. It may have been made for the Elyots in one of the foundries outside Aldgate - the letters in the inscription are similar to those used on church bells. Thomas and William Elyot have not been identified.

THE BATTLE OF RATTLIN' ROARIN' WILLIE

Robert Burns's contribution to world literature is well known and rightly praised all over the world. His poems have been translated into a variety of languages far removed from the Scottish dialect of his native Ayrshire. In addition to his original verses, however, Burns made another important contribution to Scottish literature and music. He helped save many old Scottish tunes and songs from being lost.

They were being forgotten as the life and old ways of the countryside were changing due to the agricultural and industrial revolutions. As farming became more mechanized, people left their native farms and moved to the towns.

Burns was one of a number of Scots in the late 18th century who realized that a priceless heritage was disappearing and he set out to recover for posterity as many of the old songs as he could. Walter Scott was another who gathered together the old ballads that had been handed down by word of mouth.

Burns version of the old song is about a fiddler who liked a glass of wine and who, no matter how cash-strapped, would never sell his beloved fiddle. However, over the years the years the song had several versions and a later version collected by Allan Cunningham has a more dramatic story.

Our Willie's away to Jeddart To dance on the rood-day A sharp sword by his side A fiddle to cheer the way The joyous thairms o' his fiddle Rob Rule had handled rude, And Willie left New Mill Banks Red wat wi' Robin's blude.

Our Willie's away to Jeddart – May ne'er the saints forbode That evr sae merry a fellow Should gang sae black a road For Stobs and young Falnash They followed him up and down In the links of Ousenam water They found him sleeping soun. Now may the name of Elliot Be cursed frae firth to firth He has fettrd the gude right hand That keepit the land in mirth: And charm'd maids' hearts frae dool; And sair will they want him Willie, When birks are bare at Yule.

The lasses of Ousenam water Are rugging and riving their hair And a' for the sake of Willie They ill hear his sange nae mair Nae Mair to his merrie fiddle Dance Teviot's maidens free: My curses on their cunning Wha' gured Sweet Willie dee.

Allan Cunningham, author of *The Complete Works of Robert Burns*, published in 1840, describes Willie as "a noted ballad-maker and brawler, whose sword-hand was dreaded as much as his bow-hand was admired".

Earlier, Sir Walter Scott set down the details that were known about Willie Henderson. He says that Willie was one of the early Border minstrels and he quarreled with a fellow balladeer named Sweetmilk (aka William Elliot). The two chanced to meet at an inn at Newmill, between Hawick and Jedburgh, and resolved to settle their quarrel. They left the inn and crossed the River Teviot to an open field. Willie killed his opponent and fled into the woods surrounding Jedburgh near the Oxnam Water.

In time, Willie grew tired of hiding out in the woods and rashly decided to go to the Jedburgh Rood Fair. He was spotted and trailed back to his hiding place by **Sir Gilbert Eliott of Stobs and young Elliot of Falnash**. He was handed over to the Sheriff for trial, was speedily condemned and executed at Jedburgh.

Gibraltar Connections!



Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart.





In 1782 Mozart composed an unfinished piece of music about Britain's victory in the Great Siege of Gibraltar. Mozart, who disliked the French and described himself as an "arch-Englishman" in a letter to his father, Leopold, was invited by an unnamed woman in Hungary to compose a piece for voice and piano about Britain's defence of the territory by General George Augustus Eliott, Lord Heathfield.

The words to O Calpe! (after Gibraltar's Latin name) were written in German by Michael Denis, an Austrian poet and are excessively triumphalist, with no fewer than 35 exclamation marks in 11 stanzas, but Mozart gave up setting them to music at the start of the fourth stanza.

In 2006, however, a group representing Gibraltar's campaign for self-determination issued a plea for someone to complete the job. Robin Willow, a London song-writer took on the task not only setting the remaining seven stanzas to music but having it arranged for orchestra by **Christopher Elliott** and introducing a choral section written by Max Somerset.

It received its first performance in October 2013 at the Sheldonian Theatre in Oxford (pictured below) by the Amadeus Orchestra and Berkshire Youth Choir.





NEW TRUSTEE

Andrew Jackson has agreed to become a Trustee of the Elliot Clan Society. He is first cousin to Margaret and nephew of Sir Arthur Eliott of Stobs, elder son of his sister, Jean. He followed his father and uncle into the King's Own Scottish Borderers and achieved his lifelong ambition commanding the 1st Battalion KOSB. His army career included tours to Iraq, Hong Kong, Africa, Germany and Northern Ireland, and a 4 year tour as a helicopter pilot.

He is now Chairman of the Regimental Association of the KOSB. His last four years in the British Army he achieved the rank of Brigadier appointed Director of Army Recruiting. He is now the Managing Director of Kenexa Government Solutions.

He sits on the boards of two organisations focused on helping members of the military family find employment; Non-Executive Chairman of recruit for Spouses in the UK and an active supporter of Combat Stress, a UK charity that provides support and professional psychological services to military personnel suffering from Post Traumatic Stress Disorder and other mental health issues.

His brother, Roderick Jackson, is a Trustee of the Sir Arthur Eliott Memorial Trust.

THE CHUCKLE BROTHERS



Barry and Paul Elliott were born in Rotherham to Amy and James Patton Elliott in the 1940s. They won the television talent show Opportunity Knocks in 1967 followed by success on New Faces in 1964. They launched their own television show in 1985 "Chucklehounds" which consisted of short programmes aimed at pre-school children and contained no dialogue. They were dressed in giant dog costumes. As well as regular television appearances, Paul and Barry have appeared on stage in venues across the UK with their own tours and in numerous pantomimes. In 2008 they were honoured with the Special Award at the Children's BAFTA Awards.
